Students design prototype Salvation Army Select store

Something special is in store for shoppers at Salvation Army Select.

Designed by Debbie Nestvogel and Matt Jones as their undergraduate honors thesis in interior architecture, the store in Lake Jeanette Station will be a prototype for re-selling donated clothes and accessories in a boutique atmosphere. Shoppers can expect wide aisles, stylish displays and brand-name clothing.

A ribbon-cutting ceremony is planned at the store, 3610 N. Elm Street, for 10 a.m. Friday, Nov. 13.

"As designers, we wanted to promote the Salvation Army's mission of 'Doing The Most Good' by bringing service and well-being into the community with the knowledge and skills we've gained through our education at UNCG," Nestvogel says.

Proceeds from the 5,000-square-foot store will support the Salvation Army's local work like Greensboro's Boys and Girls Clubs and Center

of Hope, a shelter to self-sufficiency.

Nestvogel will graduate in December. Jones graduated in August and now works for the Department of Interior Architecture as a lecturer and woodshop supervisor. While juggling other responsibilities, both have continued to work to make their vision a reality.

Faculty member Suzanne Cabrera served as thesis professor and mentor to the two students. This semester, studio

courses in interior architecture led by Cabrera and Stoel Burrowes have helped with projects ranging from marketing to construction of display cases.

Students and faculty in the Department of Consumer, Apparel and Retail Studies have contributed merchandising expertise. Local contractors and community volunteers have provided more help.

This new location for The Salvation Army will act not only as a retail store but as a donation center as well. It will accept all donations, but furniture, appliances and some clothes will be sent to the Salvation Army Family Store on Lee Street.

Prior to the store opening, donations can be dropped off 9 a.m.-4 p.m. Saturdays at a Salvation Army truck in the parking lot outside Salvation Army Select. Beginning Nov. 13, donations will be accepted during store hours.

Groundbreaking for JSNN Nov. 9

Joint School of Nanoscience & Nanoengineering

Officials from UNCG and N.C. A&T State University will hold a groundbreaking for the Joint School of Nanoscience & Nanoengineering at 3 p.m. Monday, Nov. 9, at the South Campus of Gateway University Research Park, 2901 E. Lee Street.

Plans will be unveiled for the 100,000-plus-square-foot research facility at the event. Featured speakers will be UNC President Erskine B. Bowles; Rep. Joe Hackney, speaker of the North Carolina House of Representatives; and Chancellors Linda P. Brady and Harold L. Martin Sr., of UNCG and N.C. A&T, respectively.

The JSNN is a collaborative project between UNCG and N.C. A&T, and its mission is to train students to conduct basic and applied research. The JSNN initially plans to offer professional Master of Science and Ph.D. degrees in nanoscience and to develop degree programs in nanoengineering. The JSNN will work closely with the Piedmont Triad community to help enhance opportunities for economic growth through its outreach and engagement activities.

The school's founding dean is Dr. James G. Ryan, who joined the project in July 2008, coming from the College of Nanoscale Science and Engineering at the University at Albany. There, he was associate vice president of technology and professor of nanoscience.

Gateway University Research Park is a collaboration between N.C. A&T and UNCG, and it will serve as a bridge to successful commercial application for the scientific research being performed at Greensboro's two high research activity universities. University officials expect that over the next 20 years, the research park will contribute \$250 million to the economy of the region.

Women's Soccer Finishes atop SoCon

Will host SoCon tourney this weekend

The women's soccer team defeated second-place Elon 1-0 to win its fourth straight Southern Conference regular-season championship. The Spartans secured the top seed and hosting duties for the SoCon Championship tournament, which will be held Nov. 6 and 8 at UNCG Soccer Stadium.

The winner of that tournament will have a spot in the NCAA Tournament.

The regular season title makes the Spartans the first SoCon women's soccer team to win four straight titles outright. Furman won five straight from 1999-2003, but shared the title in 2001. The regular-season championship is UNCG's eighth overall since joining the league in 1997.

UNCG will face Davidson at 7:30 p.m. on Friday, Nov. 6. No. 2 seed College of Charleston will face No. 3 seed Samford at 5 p.m. The title match will be at 1 p.m. on Sunday, Nov. 8. For ticket information, jfcomer@uncg.edu.

SERVE Delivers Supplies

The SERVE Center helped deliver more than 2,800 backpacks filled with food, books and other supplies to school social workers Oct. 30, in Pinehurst.

The N.C. Homeless Education Program at SERVE is overseeing distribution of the donation from Feed The Children, an international relief organization.

The materials were provided to the 250 attendees of the annual conference of the N.C. School Social Workers Association, in Pinehurst. When they return to their school districts, the social workers will give the backpacks to the state's neediest students.

An additional 500 backpacks from Feed The Children will be delivered to the SERVE Center at the North Campus of Gateway University Research Park, for school districts without a social worker at the Pinehurst conference and school districts that have an emergency.

Almost 17,000 North Carolina school children were identified as homeless during the 2007-08 school year. Although a report hasn't been finalized, it appears that number grew to about 18,000 last year says Lisa Phillips, state coordinator of the N.C. Homeless Education Program.
